How I Started with Wagner ...

It is a tradition in our society for members to tell us how they became interested in Wagner. This issue we feature member Bruce Bisenz.

When I was a small boy of 8 growing up in Silver Springs, MD at the dawn of TV, I visited a friend's home to watch their "huge" 12" B&W console TV. My favorite program was a Dumont network kid's program "Captain Video and his Video Rangers."

We kids were the Video Rangers and the salute was an "OK" thumb and forefinger started from the right eye socket and extending to arms length while chanting "Zoom."

But this was only after we were inspired by the sign on music - an excerpt (unknown to me since I didn't know what an excerpt was) from the overture of "The Flying Dutchman". That got me hooked right there.

Later, around the San Fernando Valley, my girlfriend's mom always listened to the classical FM station. Her special program had some really wonderful sign-on music. After some time I asked her "What's that music" and she replied, "That's the 'Magic Fire Music' from *Die Walküre*." Well I took good note of that (although I only knew that *Die Walküre* was an opera).

Later, I sought out Wagner's music on LP. I wound up with Eileen Farrell's version of the Immolation scene. I still remember my reaction today - I felt something unique, a deeply spiritual and emotional reaction. Then I was really REALLY hooked on the entire "Ring" and finally all of the Master's work.

What is a Wagner Tuba?

On Tuesday, February 3, 2009 Foster Beyers lead a fascinating discussion about the history of the Wagner Tuba. He talked about Wagner's search for a unique sound while he was composing the *Ring* cycle and how commissioning instruments at that time in Germany was not out of the ordinary. To help illustrate his points, a quartet of horn players from Minnesota Orchestra and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra played excerpts from the *Ring* and Bruckner's *Eighth Symphony*. He concluded his lecture by sighting examples of the use of Wagner Tuba in post-Wagner times, such as Stravinsky scores, current Hollywood sound tracks and even a few Motown pop tunes. 

I had a very active 37 year career as a TV/Film sound technician with little time to travel or even see local operas because I was so tired, working 50-60 hours a week. But in 1985 I went to see my first "Ring" in San Francisco.

I learned that there was a local Los Angeles Wagner Society. Upon my first visit, contrary to my friend's characterization of my active interest in Wagner, I found some real REAL Wagner nuts.

After that I was sure that I wanted to go to Bayreuth and asked someone there how to write to the box office. They said I was crazy and that it will take years to get into. I said I planned to live quite some more years and started writing. It only took me 6 years of writing (it takes a lot longer now!) and I was in Bayreuth.

I went up to the Festpielhaus to look around so I would be more familiar for my first opera - of course the place was deserted. The next day I rolled past crowds of spectators and lots of police guards (with ankle length green leather overcoats) on my way to the parking lot. Wow! I thought this is a big to-do for each opera!

After the astounding first act of *Lohengrin*, I watched a gauntlet of people glad hand the patrons out of the Loges. I mingled with the well dressed crowd wondering about an older man, dressed as a waiter, talking to an obviously high ranking German military man.

I edged around to see four stars on the cuff of his "Mess Jacket" and then the miniature medals that I recognized from my time in the Army. This was a full General talking to his NATO counterpart. Since the US Army was not well known for opera attendance I intuited the obvious - they were there to accompany German heads of State and Culture and other notables.

On my first visit I had blundered into the impossible - tickets to the opening of the 1991 Bayreuth Festival! Well it only got better over the years so I am hoping to see David Cline there, where I met him, next summer for my 12th season.
